The Barock Pinto Horse - Description

The Barock Pinto Horse A functionally and harmoniously build, black and white Pinto horse, consisting of the typical breed characteristics with sufficient pedigree, being healthy and vital, and has aptitude to perform for sport at the highest level. The Barock Pinto horse has at least 37.5% Friesian blood. The Barock Pinto horse originated from a crossbreeding between a type of Pinto Warmblood horse and a Friesian horse.

Quality, Elegance and Character By crossbreeding Friesian horses with black and white tobiano warmbloods, the ultimate breeding goal is a black and white horse with a friendly and willing character, generous horses with a correct foundation, a striking appearance due to their long mane and functional way of moving.

Exterior

Head A solid, expressive, noble head, the eyes are far apart. The nasal bone is preferably slightly concave, with large nostrils. The jaws are light, and the mouth gap is long. The eyes are large and bright. The small, attentive ears point lightly towards each other.

Neck The long neck forms a slightly upward curve. The neck shows much upwards direction. The neck comes out of the chest high and has a flowing connection with the withers. The neck is long (hand-width) with a flowing connection to the neck. The throatlatch has an open underline with room by the throat.

Throat cut The throat cut has an open underline with space at the throat passage.

Mane The Barock Pinto horse has an abundance of hair in the form of mane, tail and lower legs (feathers).

Color and markings

A Barock Pinto horse has a black pinto color. The horse/foal must have at least two white spots on the body with a diameter of 10 cm or it has to be verified through DNA color analysis that the horse carries the Tobiano factor. The standard color of the horse is displayed on the studbook certificate. Markings are not mentioned in the certificate.

All colors of pinto are permitted, the horse will be registered as type XX or type FB if they are not a black and white pinto color.

Blue Eyes

Blue eyes (also called moon eyes) are allowed.

Movement

Walk The walk is spacious and a clean 4-track. The legs, while walking, are straight from the front legs to the hind legs. The hind leg shows bend in the hock and is powerful and well placed under

the body. The hind dispels the front leg, which is widely moved forward with much freedom in the shoulder.

Trot The trot is a clean 2-track. The hind leg is powerful and well placed under the body. It shows great bend in the hock while trotting. The front leg shows knee action and is placed forward spaciouly. The trot is characterized by suppleness and a long moment of suspension. The horse exhibits a lot of balance and rises in the front, with an elevated neck. The legs, while trotting, are straight from the front legs to the hind legs

Canter The canter is a clean 3-track. The canter is spacious with a grabbing front leg and a weight-carrying inside leg. The canter is directed upward and shows a long moment of suspension, lots of suppleness and balance too.

Use

The purpose of the Barock Pinto horse varies from recreational use to participation at the highest levels in competitive sports. The disciplines in which the Barock Pinto horses are presented:

- Ridden dressage - Jumping
- Carriage driving (dressage and combined)
- Combined competitions – endurance – Working Equitation

Registers

The studbook has four registers:

Registration 1: If both parents are unknown.

Registration 2: When mother and father are known.

Registration 3: When both parents and grandparents are known.

Foalbook: When at the moment of microchipping/registration, both parents, grandparents and great-grandparents (three generations on both sides) are traceable, the foal will be registered in the Foal Book. The father must be a recognized or approved (star) stallion registered in the BPS. Only then will the foal be registered in the Foal Book. Foals of non-approved or non-recognized stallions will be enrolled into one of the pre-books.

Types

BP: Friesian horses with less than 62.5% foreign blood. Must be 37.5 Friesian blood.

XX: Warmblood horses that have more than 62.5% foreign blood.

FB: Horses that have less than 62.5% foreign blood and are not Pinto black. Friesian horses are registered in this category.

General Information

Accountability

The BPANA/BPS is not accountable for damages and accidents to person, horses and material. The participants are present at their own risk. The owners submit to the asked provisions. By competing the exhibitors declare that they unconditionally submit to the rulings of the board. This is both for the judging of the horses as well as the interpretation of the provisions.

Appeal

An appeal may be filed against the result of an inspection. An appeal can consist of the request for a re-inspection or a re-measurement.

Re-inspection

The BPS studbook offers the possibility for a re-inspection. The re-inspection must be requested in writing or per email within seven days after the inspection of the horse at the studbook office, accompanied with a clear motivation of the owners reasoning for a re-inspection. When a horse is re-inspected, the results of the first inspection are overwritten. The result of the judges is binding. The cost of a re-inspection must be paid in cash or through the bank before the inspection. The composition of the judges must be at least 50 % different from the original jury.

Re-measurement

An objection against the measurement can be submitted within 1 hour after the initial measurement, in writing to the inspection host. A re-measurement takes place by a different the second judge who does not use the same measuring stick. The outcome of the second measurement is binding and cannot be appealed.

Arena Size

The arena can be grass or loose sand/dirt type. It needs to be level and minimally the size of a small dressage arena which is about 60.5 x 131.0 feet (20x40 meters). All horses will be shown in hand on a triangle that needs to be a minimum of 30 ft (10 meters) per side, with a maximum size of 150 feet (45 meters) per side. It must be secure enough to have horses at liberty so the judge(s) can evaluate the canter. It would also be used for the IBOP ridden tests which require a large dressage arena, 60.5 x 197 feet (20x60 meters).

The driving area can be anywhere that is level, does not have to be fenced, and should be minimally the size of a large dressage arena which is 60.5 x 197 feet (20x60 meters).

Judges will need a table and chairs with access to power placed in the arena (out of the way behind the area where the judges will evaluate the horses on conformation). Internet access is desired.

Attire

All persons presenting a horse are **required** to wear a white shirt with a grey tie and black trousers. White sneakers are desired.

ASTM/SEI Safety certified helmets are mandatory for those handling stallions, riders, carriage drivers and passengers.

Drivers should adhere to the general rules of carriage pleasure driving in North America. Conservative driving attire is required for the driving test, including an apron and gloves. This means men should wear a jacket and tie, driving apron or lap robe, helmet and gloves. Women should wear a long sleeve blouse or jacket, driving apron or lap robe, helmet, and gloves. Brightly colored clothing is not appropriate.

Bridle Tag Number

Horses must be shown with a bridle tag number on both sides of the bridle. Two bridle tags will be in each entry packet. Please

secure them to each side of the bridle prior to showing your horse. Mothers of foals may wear the foals number on their bridle.

BPANA Membership

The horse owner must be a full, business or lifetime member of BPANA to enter horses into inspections.

Class Times/Size

The horses that are to be inspected are divided into groups of 15 horses maximum. The foals will be divided into fillies and colts. For each group, the arena will be opened for a set amount of time. There are times listed in the catalog for the concerning section. When a horse/foal is not at the arena on time, the arena is closed and this horse can no longer be inspected. The order of the horses that are to be inspected, is determined by the site host.

Decisions General Board

In every case/situation that these regulations do not provide, the general board members of the BPANA/BPS will decide. The board is authorized to extend the terms mentioned in these regulations.

Exclusion

If a person does not meet the conditions of these regulation, the BPANA/BPS can exclude a horse from participating. Also, inspection results can be declared invalid by the BPS, when (afterwards) it is shown that the conditions of these regulations are not met.

Grooming

Feathers - For horses in the BP type, feathers are not permitted to be shaven.

Mane and Tail - The mane and tail are not permitted to be pulled or shaved. The tail may only be cut straight at the bottom. If the

mane and/or tail are pulled or shaved, there will a point deducted from the section breed-type. This will be clearly stated on the inspection form (-1).

Ears and Muzzle - The ears and muzzle are not permitted to be shaven. The outside hair of the ears may be neatly trimmed but no hair inside the ear may be shaved. The sensory hairs on the muzzle, lower nose and around the eyes may not be shaved or trimmed. The hair under the jawline may be shaved or trimmed.

Handling of Horses

The horses must be presented as natural as possible and in peace. The judges may terminate the presentation for overusing the whip or any other inhumane treatment of the horses.

Horses are presented on a hard surface by hand by a handler and assistant.

During the in hand presentation in the arena with all horses in the class, only the handler can enter with the horse.

During the free presentation in the arena the horses are accompanied by a handler and assistant, to keep the horse in movement, unless indicated differently by the judges.

Foals are presented next to the mare, by a handler and assistant. The handler and accompanist must always follow the directions of the ringmaster and/or judges. When these directions are not followed, the presentation and judging will be terminated.

Horse Registration

All horses must be registered with BPANA/BPS prior to entering the horse into an inspection. The information of the owner on the Inspection Entry Form must match the owner listed on the BPS horse registration certificate. When the registered owner on the registration certificate does not match the owner signing up on the Inspection Entry Form, the registration certificate must be

transferred to the new owner's name before the owner may enter the horse in an inspection.

Inspection Entry Form

The inspection entry form must be completed on the BPANA website. Horses who do not have a completed inspection entry form will not be inspected.

The form must be filled out completely. Applications after closing will not be processed.

Judge Inspect horses "Blind"

The judges do not have information on lineage or owner. The judges have knowledge of the catalog number, name of the horse and age. For the stallion inspection/selection, lineage is added to the judge's information.

Lameness

If a horse appears to be lame before the inspection begins, the owner may withdraw the horse. If the horse is presented anyway, it is at the owners' risk and the results are valid.

Removal of Horse from Inspection Prior to Inspection

When a horse does not appear at the inspection due to illness or injury, a veterinary statement must be submitted to the BPANA Secretary for a refund of entry fees. If this statement is not submitted (a maximum of 2 days after the inspection), the inspection costs will not be refunded.

Repeat Inspection within the same Calendar Year

When a horse or foal is offered for inspection more than once a year, the first result will be the recorded result on the horse's registration papers. The owner will pay the usual inspection fees.

Shoeing

Horses are allowed to wear horseshoes on every hoof while being presented, provided that the shoeing matches the requirements: standard shoeing, maximum thickness of 8 mm and maximum width of 25 mm. It is not allowed to have wedges, soles or other pads/attachments.

When the judges find unauthorized shoeing, the horse may be excluded from the inspection.

Stallion Genetic Testing

All stallions owners must provide a copy of the stallion's genetic test results to the registrar prior to being entered into an inspection. Stallions who are carriers of genetic defects will not be approved for breeding but may be shown.

Surrender of Registration Certificates

The registration certificates for each horse must be given to the gate attendant prior to entering the arena for your class. Horses for which the registration certificate has not been handed in cannot be inspected. If an upgrade is not received, the registration certificate will be returned to the owner at the inspection. If an upgrade is received, a new registration certificate will be mailed to the owner with the inspection date and upgrade listed on the registration certificate.

Tack

Horses 3 years and older must be shown in either white or black bridles. Bits should be snaffle, French link snaffle or Mullen. Bits that are severe, have a curb mouthpiece, shanks or curb straps are NOT allowed. Foals must be shown in white or black halters. Headstalls should not have reins or cavessons. Studchains, V chains or in-hand attachments are allowed but may not be attached over the nose.

Vaccinations

Vaccination must be up to date and proof of vaccinations provided. The horse must have been vaccinated for influenza in the following way: A basic vaccination, consisting of 2 vaccinations. The second vaccination must have been given a minimum of 3 weeks and a maximum of 13 weeks after the initial vaccination. The annual vaccination, which cannot be later than 12 months after the previous vaccination. The last vaccination has to be given a minimum of one week before the inspection. Advise is to vaccinate colts from the age of four months old (not before that, due to the immunity in the mothers colostrum). The Horses that did not receive the proper vaccination cannot be admitted to the inspection grounds and therefore, not inspected. **All horses must be vaccinated specific to the recommendations of the local, state and federal regulations.**

Veterinary Actions

Banned Substances

At inspections and other BPANA/BPS events, the horses must be free of substances on the FEI list of banned substances. Horses that are receiving medications, that are governed by the Equestrian Doping Regulations, are not permitted to take part in the inspection. These horses are directed to another inspection and must be free of materials that are mentioned on the FEI list of banned substances.

The BPANA/BPS may conduct random sample collection for banned substances at all inspections and events. All owners are required to cooperate. The cost of these tests will be paid by BPANA/BPS. However, if a horse tests positive for banned substances, the costs for testing will be paid by the owner and the owner will be be disbarred from BPANA/BPS for a minimum of three years. The owners' name will be posted on the BPS website and in the BPS magazine.

Measuring Horses, Microchip Verification

At the first viewing in the morning all horses 3+ year old and older will be measured by the Judges, or a Board Member of BPANA/BPSNL, on a flat surface. You must bring your horse and **the horses' registration papers** to the measuring area on time. Microchips will be verified with a microchip reader and compared to the registration papers.

Measurement Minimum Requirements

Approved Stallion.....	160cm
Star Stallion	158cm
Studbook Mare.....	156 cm
Elite Mare.....	160 cm
Gelding.....	156 cm

Prior Surgery

In the case of a horse that has had to undergo surgery, such as neurectomy (nerve cut), tenotomy (severed tendon), or other surgery, the owner needs to report this via a veterinary report. Every 'treatment' that a horse receives between declaration and inspection, must be reported to the BPANA Registrar. When this is not completed, the horse will not be inspected. Not reporting these operations will lead to the disbarment of the member from the BPANA/BPS for three years.

Additionally, the horse in question will be removed from the register it is enrolled in. This applies to every horse in the name of this particular owner.

The Inspection Entry Fee must be paid on the BPANA website prior to completing the Inspection Entry form as the entrant will need the payment/invoice number to enter it on the Inspection Entry Form.

Other Fees:

Facility fee- a fee for the use of the facility for the inspection charged and payable to the site host. This fee varies with the facility costs.

Stall Fee – charged by the site host based on facility charges for stalls. This fee varies.

Upgrade Fee – varies based on type of upgrade. Fee for change to the registration certificate for an upgrade to Star / Elite / Approved Stallion /Studbook Registries for horses 3 years and older.

The member will be invoiced for upgrade fees by BPANA after the inspection.

Eligibility for Entry to Inspections

Foals, youth and adult horses who turn the age of 3 in the year of the inspection, may participate in the inspection.

1. **Three year old or older mare, registered in the foalbook, prebook 1, prebook 2 or prebook 3.**

The minimum height is 156 cm.

To be added to the studbook, a mare must score at least 36 points, with a maximum of 1 inadequate for the gaits.

If the mare scores lower than a 5 for the gaits, she will not be accepted into the studbook.

In the case of adequate quality of exterior and movement, mares can be declared Star or Elite.

The mares will be inspected on a hard surface (street) first, for breed-type, build, legwork, walk, trot and canter. After that the mares are inspected on walk, trot and canter in the arena, by means of free movement.

Predicates

Star Second Premium

The mare receives the status of Star 2nd premium with a minimum score of 40 points and does not score an inadequate score for the gaits.

Star First Premium

The mare will receive the status of Star 1st premium, when a minimum score of 42 points is achieved and does not score an inadequate for the gaits.

The minimum height for a star is 158 cm.

Provisional Elite

A mare can receive the status of Provisional Elite, when a minimum of 44 points are obtained and does not score an inadequate score for the gaits.

The minimum height for Elite is 160 cm.

Elite

After performing an IBOP with a passing score (Individual Usability Research Horses) the mare becomes a permanent Elite.

2. Inspection for enrollment in the Gelding Book.

The three year old and older geldings that are eligible for this, must be registered in the colt book, pre-book 1, pre-book 2 or pre-book For registration in the Gelding Book, they must have a minimum height of 156 cm.

When the quality is adequate and the height is 158 cm, the gelding will be declared Star. The geldings will be inspected on a hard surface (street) first, for breed-type, legwork, walk and trot. After this, the geldings are inspected at a walk, trot and canter in the arena, by means of free movement.

3. Premium Inspection for one year old and two year old Fillies and Colts.

Yearlings are not inspected on a hard surface (street), but only on breed-type, build, legwork, walk, trot and canter in the arena by means of free movement.

One year olds and two year olds can receive a premium.

First premium in case the colt scores a minimum of 42 points and no score lower than a 5.5 in a specific section.

Second premium in case the colt scores a minimum of 40 points and no score lower than a 5.5 in a specific section.

Third premium in case the colt scores a minimum of 36 points and on a maximum of one section lower than a 5.5.

No premium in case the colt scores less than 36 points or more than two times inadequate scores gaits.

4. Premium inspection and increase in predicate for four year old and older star-mares.

5. Premium inspection for Elite-mares.

6. Inspection of colts and mare fillies (see youth).

Foal Inspection, Identification and Registration

All foals born before the first of October of the concerning calendar year are inspected at a studbook or home inspection. foals that are under six weeks are not eligible for inspection. The obtained premium will be mentioned on the registration certificate. The inspection of foals is not mandatory. The studbook, however, does appreciate the inspection of foals, for the insight in the breeding results of the stallions, for the studbook. The foal inspection will be one viewing.

Identification

A foal must have a microchip inserted within six months after the birth. All foals and adult horses must have a microchip matching the number listed on their registration form to be eligible for inspection.

Registration of foals

The BP Studbook conducts studbook-registration of horses that can contribute to the breeding-goal for the benefit of members and non-members. Registration means the registration of the lineage of a horse and records, predicates and obtained premiums. To ensure a correct registration of the lineage, the following rules need to be followed.

A foal must be with to the mother at the time of microchipping

When this is not the case, the registration can only happen after DNA verification. The BPS registers all foals through DNA verification. When DNA research is necessary to determine maternity/paternity, this will be done at the cost of the owner. When the lineage cannot be determined through DNA verification for the foal, the studbook certificate will show 'unknown'. In the case of the mother of the foal passing away during the first six months, the foal must be microchip inserted by a licensed

veterinarian within a week. The application must then be accompanied with a statement from the veterinarian confirming the mothers passing. When the term is exceeded, the lineage has to be confirmed by DNA research, at the cost of the owner.

Stallion Inspection

The BPS recognizes two types of breeding-stallions:

Approved Studbook stallions- 44 points or above

Star stallion with breeding-license (breeding limit of maximum 50 mares per year) – 42-44 points

The stallions are inspected based on lineage, performance during the inspection and an IBOP or through outstanding performance in sports.

All approved stallions of E.U. studbooks, that meet the breeding goal or can contribute to our breeding goal are acknowledged by our studbook. We acknowledge stallions from the AES, KWPN, NRPS and the Veulenboek (foalbook).

Genetic Defects

An approved stallion is not allowed to be a carrier of hereditary defects.

Stallion Names and Numbers

Stallions that are submitted to the BP studbook and Star stallions that receive a breeding-license must have a Dutch or Royal name, Stable-names or additives are not permitted. These stallions will receive the additive BP after their name and a number (for instance Bonte Piet BP01). Name changes are allowed until the horse is registered in the main Studbook.

If you are presenting a stallion for Approval, you will select three Dutch, Royal and/or Friesian names for the judges to choose from. Please select three name choices and provide them to the Registrar at the Inspection when you pick up your registration packet. If you do not select 3 names for the judges to select from,

the judge will select and name your stallion. There is no guarantee that the judge will select one of the three names that you provide, but, they will make every effort to do so. If your stallion is selected, the judge will announce his new name when his approval is announced.

Stallion Permanent Approval Status Requirements

To receive permanent Approval a stallion must meet the following requirements:

Repeat Inspections

BPS stallions which have been approved must be presented at the stud inspection for the first three years after the approval.

IBOP Test

Both BPS Approved and Star stallions must perform an IBOP test with a passing score within three years after approval.

Offspring

A minimum of 20 different offspring must be inspected with an average of (desirable) 40 points (see breeding-conditions). After three years, the breeding-commission will create a report on the stallion and will advise the board to maintain, refuse or give the stallion respite (per year, in the case of not enough offspring approved and the quality of the approved offspring scores above the average of 40 points) or to put on hold (in the case of not enough offspring approved and the quality of the offspring is below the average of 40 points).

Unknown Lineage

The studbook can approve a stallion, of which the lineage is not fully known, but of which it is clear that they satisfy the breeding-goal as determined by the BPS. In these cases it regards a

breeding-license for a maximum of 50 mares per year. The stallion inspection regulations apply to these horses. Registration of the offspring will take place in one of the pre-books, when one of the parents, grandparents or great-grandparents is unknown.

Inspection Categories

Category 1- Stallion 3 years and Older

The Barock Pinto recognizes two types of breeding-stallions:

- Studbook stallions (no limit to number of mares bred)
- Star stallion with breeding-license (breeding limit of maximum 50 mares per year)

The stallions are inspected based on lineage, own performance during the stud-inspection and IBOP or through outstanding performance in sports. Approved stallions receive a studbook number. All approved studs of E.U. studbooks, that meet our breeding-goal or that can contribute to our breeding-goal are acknowledged by our studbook. In The Netherlands we acknowledge the studs from the AES, KWPN, NRPS and the Veulenboek (Coltbook). Colts of not-approved or not-recognized studs will be enrolled into one of the pre-books.

To become an **Approved Stallion** and enrolled into the studbook, the stallion must score a minimum of 44 points, without any inadequate on the gaits.

The minimum height is 160 cm. The stallion is not allowed to possess hereditary defects.

To become a **Star stallion** the stallion must score between 42 and 43 points without inadequate on the gaits and will receive a breeding-license for a maximum of 50 mares per year

The minimum height is 158 cm. The stallion is not allowed to possess hereditary defects.

Both Approved and Star stallions with a breeding-license must perform an IBOP test with passing results and have 20 offspring tested with average scores of 40 within three years after approval.

The Registry Stallion Category has been removed from the BPS regulations this year. Any stallion receiving a Registry designation prior to 2026 will continue to be recognized as a Registry Stallion, approved to breed a maximum of 10 mares per year.

All KFPS Approved studbook stallions who receive a score of 44 points or more will become an Approved FB stallion in the BPS without performing an IBOP Test at a BPS Inspection.

Category 2 – Mares 3 Years and older

The mares will be inspected on a hard surface (street) first, for breed-type, build, legwork, walk, trot and canter. After that the mares are inspected on walk, trot and canter in the arena, by means of free movement.

Inspections for enrollment into the studbook.

Eligible mares are: Three year old or older mare who are registered in the foalbook, prebook 1, prebook 2 or prebook 3.

Horses who turn the age of 3 in the relevant year of the inspection may participate at the inspection.

The minimum height has to be 156 cm.

To be added to the studbook, the mare must score at least 36 points, with a maximum of 1 inadequate for the gaits. If the mare scores lower than a 5 for the gaits, she will not be accepted into the studbook.

In the case of adequate quality of exterior and movement, mares can be declared Star 1st or 2nd Premium or Elite.

Star 2nd Premium - The mare receives the status of Star 2nd premium in the case of scoring a minimum of 40 points and does not score an inadequate for the gates.

Star 1st Premium - The mare will receive the status of Star 1st premium, when a minimum of 42 points is achieved and the mare did not score an inadequate for the gates.

The minimum height for a star mare is 158 cm.

Provisional Elite - A mare can receive the status of provisionally Elite, when a minimum of 44 points are obtained and no inadequate is scored on the gates.

The minimum height for Elite status is 160 cm.

After obtaining a positive IBOP (Individual Usability Research Horses) the mare receives a permanent Elite predicate.

All KFPS Crown or Model mares who receive a score of 44 points or more will become Elite without performing an IBOP test at a BPS Inspection.

Category 3 - Colt for the Foalbook

All colts born before the first of October of the concerning calendar year are inspected at a studbook or home inspection.

Colts that are under six weeks are not eligible for inspection.

The obtained premium will be printed on the registration certificate.

The inspection of colts is not mandatory.

The studbook, however, does appreciate the inspection of colts, for the insight in the breeding results of the stallions, for the studbook.

The colt inspection will have just one viewing.

Category 4 – Filly for the Foalbook

All fillies born before the first of October of the concerning calendar year are inspected at a studbook or home inspection.

Fillies that are under six weeks are not eligible for inspection.

The obtained premium will be printed on the registration certificate.

The inspection of fillies is not mandatory. The studbook, however, does appreciate the inspection of fillies, for the insight in the breeding results of the stallions, for the studbook.

The filly inspection will have just one viewing.

Category 5 - Colt Youth 1-2 Years

Yearlings are not inspected on a hard surface (street), but only on breed-type, build, legwork, walk, trot and canter in the arena by means of free movement.

One year olds and two year olds can receive a premium. First premium in case the youth scores a minimum of 42 points and on a specific section no lower than a 5,5.

Second premium in case the youth scores a minimum of 40 points and on a specific section no lower than a 5,5.

Third premium in case the colt scores a minimum of 36 points and on a maximum of one section no lower than a 5.

No premium in case the colt scores less than 36 points or more than two times inadequate.

Category 6 - Filly Youth 1-2 Years

Yearlings are not inspected on a hard surface (street), but only on breed-type, build, legwork, walk, trot and canter in the arena by means of free movement.

One year olds and two year olds can receive a premium. First premium in case the youth scores a minimum of 42 points and on a specific section no lower than a 5,5.

Second premium in case the youth scores a minimum of 40 points and on a specific section no lower than a 5,5.

Third premium in case the colt scores a minimum of 36 points and on a maximum of one section no lower than a 5.

No premium in case the colt scores less than 36 points or more than two times inadequate.

Category 7 – Geldings 3 Years and Older

Inspection for enrollment in the Gelding-book. The three year old and older geldings that are eligible for this, must be registered in the colt book, pre-book 1, pre-book 2 or pre-book 3.

For registration in the Gelding-book, they must have a minimum height of 156 cm.

When the quality is adequate and the height (158 cm) is correct, the gelding will be declared Star.

The geldings will be inspected on a hard surface (street) first, for breed-type, legwork, walk trot and canter.

After this, the geldings are inspected on walk, trot and canter in the arena, by means of free movement.

Category 8– IBOP Ridden

A passing score for the Ridden IBOP is 60 points

A horse is allowed to take part in an IBOP test in the year it turns four years old.

In addition to the test, you have 1 minute to demonstrate and exhibit your horse with any additional skills you want to show. This is for a positive addition to the test, to emphasize your horse's quality and training. This is not obligatory and will not result in any decreased score if the participant elects not to participate in this additional option.

A test reader is allowed near arena.

Bit and use of whip are in accordance with the USDF regulations.

Rider attire is as customary and in accordance with USDF
Helmet is required.

Horse must appear healthy, sound and well-groomed.

Jury decision is final regarding all inappropriate behavior and /or irregularity.

Category 9 – IBOP Driven

A passing driven IBOP score is 45 points.

A horse is allowed to take part in an IBOP test in the year it turns four years old.

In addition to the test, you have 1 minute to demonstrate and exhibit your horse with any additional skills you want to show. This is for a positive addition to the test, to emphasize your horse's quality and training. This is not obligatory and will not result in any decreased score if the participant elects not to participate in this additional option.

A test reader is allowed at carriage or near arena.

Bit, harness and use of whip are in accordance with the Dutch dressage regulations,

KNHS regulations for driving and possibly in consultation with the jury.

Rider attire is as customary and in accordance with the Dutch driving regulations, KNHS, regulations for driving. Helmet or hat is obligatory.

Horse must appear healthy, sound and well-groomed.

Jury decision regarding all inappropriate behavior or and irregularity is final.

Star declaration based on IBOP test

A horse can participate in an IBOP test from the year it turns four. They can increase the points, received for the gates at the studbook inspection, through an IBOP test. If the horse

has received a 6 on walk, but a 6,5 during the IBOP, then the horse receives a 0,5 bonus point. This also goes for the trot and canter. One condition is that the IBOP score must be adequate (60 point under the saddle and 45 points in front of a cart). The horse can be declared Star, due to the bonus points and positive IBOP score. When a horse scores lower during the IBOP than at the studbook inspection, the studbook inspection results stand. The achieved points will be stated on the studbook certificate, including possible bonus points. This upgrade is valid for each predicate; Studbook, Second star, First star, Star and Elite.

Category 10 – Barock Pinto Studbook Approved Stallions

The minimum height is 160 cm.

The stallion is not allowed to possess hereditary defects.

with passing results within three years after approval

BPANA Inspection Duties

It takes a group of volunteers to have a successful inspection. It is helpful to have meetings with the volunteers who will be helping at the inspection in the months prior to the inspection for planning. Below are some specific duties which can be assigned in advance of the inspection.

Volunteers

We recommend that each person wear some sort of identification to help differentiate them from the general public. Suggest that they wear a specific color shirt or t-shirt so that it is easy to identify them and that they also wear a name tag.

Scribe/Judges Liason

The judge's liaison is stationed at the table with the judges or with the announcer within the judging area.

This person is responsible for recording all scores on the computer and provide the results to the site host who will email all results to the BPANA Secretary at secretary@barockpinto.com.

Provides score cards for judges to complete and give to owners.

Provides stallion owner requested new name cards to judges for stallions that are approved for BPS and Star Stallions. Registry stallions do not have a name change.

Provides correct ribbons and awards for judges or presenters to award to the horses.

Recorder - optional

Maintains dry erase board for day schedule and class results

Check-in Person arrive at ____ night before and ____ morning of inspection

Checks horses' Coggins and Health Certificates as they arrive as applicable

Provides entry packets to participants

Directs individuals to the appropriate barn and stall number

Announcer /DJ

Sets up PA and music system

Announces entries and results to the audience

Needs to be very familiar with process, and Dutch language

May also play music

Music-Plays music at appropriate volume and times

Gate Keepers – 2 people are desired

Crowd control for horses. Keeps the horses separate during inspection. Monitors area for safety.

Barn Point Person

Coordinates with arena point person and barn to send horses for each class

Cashier

Person to collect money for food/raffle tickets

Judges Host/ Transportation Liaison

Individual to pickup and return Judges/Runners to airport/train station

Should be available at all times during the inspection for the Judges and Runners transportation or other needs

Ensures judges and runners have drinks, snacks etc. during the inspection.

Arena Point Person

Lines up horses in correct order Ensures numbers are on horses.

Collects registration papers and provides them to judges.

Communicates with Barn Point Person regarding beginning/ending of classes etc..

Security Guard

It is in your best interest to have a security guard on duty during the evening hours if none of the volunteer staff are at the inspection facility.

BP Horse Ambassadors

Walks a BP for general public to pet and take photos with

Assistant-measuring

Helps measure horses, assists judges to check microchips

Food servers

If not using a catering truck and providing lunch.

Decorations


Sets up all plants, decorations, flags, banners and photo area

Flower Awards

Obtains bouquets of flowers for championship awards for each category and wrap with ribbons(if needed) place in buckets or vases of water near location that awards will be given to participants.

(Horse must be 4 years old. Arena: 20 x 40 m., Rising or sitting trot permitted. Correct outfit required. Only a simple bit is allowed. Any other equipment/matters only in consultation with the judges.)

Horses in the Arena

All handlers are expected to maintain a safe distance
between their horse and any surrounding horses in and out of
the arena.

General Arena Requirements

The general arena for in hand and at liberty work can be
grass or loose sand/dirt type. It needs to be level and
minimally the size of a small dressage arena which is about
60.5 x 131.0 feet (20x40 meters).

A dressage arena is required for ridden IBOPS and driving
dressage arena required for driven IBOPS. These can be set
up in the general arena and removed for the in hand classes.

IBOP ridden tests require a large dressage arena, 60.5 x 197
feet (20x60 meters).

The driving area can be anywhere that is level, does not have
to be fenced, and should be minimally the size of a large
dressage arena which is 60.5 x 197 feet (20x60 meters).

All horses will be shown in hand on a triangle that needs to be a minimum of 30 ft (10 meters) per side, with a maximum size of 150 feet (45 meters) per side. It must be secure enough to have horses

Stallion Arena Requirements

20 X 40 meters (65 X130 feet) is the optimum arena size to show stallions at liberty. The fencing should be a height that the stallions cannot jump out of. Six feet high chain link fence panels have been used for this type of arena.

Stallions will be shown at liberty. It is desirable to have arena assistants who are experienced at moving horses at liberty. A figure 8 pattern of movement is required to observe movement. The Judges table and white pvc triangles should be placed at each end of arena to allow the stallion to move in a figure 8 pattern. Simple plants or flowers may be used for decoration if a they do not interfere with the horses' ability to move freely.

Awards

All ribbon awards will be provided by the BPANA.

Each site is responsible to provide flower awards to each champion and reserve champion in the Championship Classes
